“A Message For Challenging Times”

The 2014 General Assembly approved a proposed amendment to the *Book of Order* that would change the definition of marriage from a union between a man and a woman to a union between two people. Before the amendment could become part of our church’s constitution, it had to be ratified by a majority of presbyteries. That has now happened.

The new language reads:

“Marriage is a gift God has given to all humankind for the wellbeing of the entire human family. Marriage involves a unique commitment between two people, traditionally a man and a woman, to love and support each other for the rest of their lives. The sacrificial love that unites the couple sustains them as faithful and responsible members of the church and the wider community.

“In civil law, marriage is a contract that recognizes the rights and obligations of the married couple in society. In the Reformed tradition, marriage is also a covenant in which God has an active part, and which the community of faith publicly witnesses and acknowledges.”

In a separate action, the General Assembly voted to allow clergy to perform marriage ceremonies for same sex couples in states where they are legal. As with all marriages, ministers are not required to perform such a ceremony if they don’t think it is appropriate and, as with all marriages, the Session must vote to allow such services on church property. Not surprisingly there was much controversy surrounding these actions.

I want to share with you a prayer written after

the presbyteries had voted approval by Sally Hughes, a good pastor friend of both Bill Williamson and me. Sally, who led our session retreat last year, is pastor of the Historic Franklin Presbyterian Church in Brentwood, Tennessee.

Loving and merciful Lord,

You can be called by many names and your name can be modified by many words such as magnificent, powerful, almighty, holy—but this morning, in the light of yesterday’s PC(USA) vote to allow clergy to perform same sex marriages,

“And now faith, hope, and love abide, these three; and the greatest of these is love.”

1 Corinthians 13:13

I call on you as the loving and merciful Lord of the church. Your love is needed to bind together the people who are divided over this issue. Your love is needed to be the focal point as we seek to love each other, even in disagreement. Your love is needed to restore hope to those who now think this denomination has lost its way; your love is needed to give humility to those who now think they have “won.”

Your mercy is needed to forgive our church, now and in the past and even moving forward, for choosing division over unity. Your mercy is needed to forgive us for looking at rules on a page instead into each other’s eyes. Your mercy is needed to forgive us for creating climates of fear instead of churches of welcome.

Love us and have mercy on us when we cannot see Christ in one another. Love us and have mercy on us when we spend so much

Notes from Session

HBPres Vision Statement

Harvey Browne Church is a community of Believers that glorifies God and honors tradition as it seeks new ways of growing in faith, sharing our beliefs and putting our faith into practice.

HBPres Purpose Statement

HBPres is called to make a difference by making disciples who faithfully follow Jesus, study the Bible, and love one another by serving our neighbors.

The Session of **HBPres** met on March 3, 2015 for a stated meeting. Following the devotion given by Alice Judy the following business was handled:

- Chandra Gordon and Walt Koczot gave the Trustees Report. Their report was included in the 2014 Ministry Overview.
- The three small groups from the January Session retreat gave updates on their work:
 1. The Mission Team reported plans to have a Mission Sunday at which time displays of our mission work and groups **HBPres** that supports would be set up to inform the congregation of our mission involvement. We would also like to have a Mission Saturday when many micro-missions are done in one day.
 2. The Worship and Music Committee is providing several opportunities for conversation with the congregation regarding moving to two worship services in the fall. Times for these conversations have been made known to the congregation.
 3. The Session approved a recommendation from the Marketing Team that the Session designate two of its members to recruit a team to co-ordinate Special Events/Fundraisers and that one of those Elders continue to serve as the initial chair of the team. The Special Events Team was charged with the task of hosting fundraising events for mission with at least three events per year and exploring the institution of an indoor farmer's market during the winter months. The first event will occur sometime after the start of the new program year. The Special Events Team will now be a part of Spiritual Formation Committee.
- The Presbytery's Education Unit will recognize the contributions of adults 70+ years old with a special program at the May 11 Presbytery meeting. Session was asked to select someone to be recognized for their work at **HBPres**, the presbytery and the larger community. The Session selected Fred and Wilma Bennett for this honor.

The next called meeting of the Session will be Tuesday April 14, 2015 at which time the session will examine new officers. New officers will be ordained and installed on April 26 during the 11:00 AM worship service.

Grocery Cart

The recipient of Grocery Cart donations for April is House of Ruth, a nonprofit organization founded in 1992 to meet the local service needs of women and children infected or affected by HIV/AIDS. The service population has since expanded to include men living with HIV/AIDS and the lives of more than 1,100 people, including nearly 300 children and 700 households each year. House of Ruth offers housing and support services with a holistic focus on individuals who are HIV-positive, as well as their family members who count on them for financial and emotional support, especially social and physical needs. Client services include housing programs, case management, children's programs, financial assistance, social gatherings/holiday events, adult life skills workshops, advocacy and education.

Items most needed are:

- men's deodorant and shaving cream
- toilet paper and paper towels
- shampoo
- men's adult diapers (pull-up style, smaller sizes)
- bleach
- small/travel size laundry detergent (helpful for our homeless clients)
- bottled water
- copy paper

Red Hands Project



A total of 155 “red hands” have been signed by members of **HBPres**, along with a few others from outside the church. These will be sent to the PC(USA)’s United Nations Office and then delivered to one of the countries on the list of those that have not signed the protocol to ban child soldiers. Twenty-six countries have ratified the protocol since Presbyterians began participating in the campaign but there are thirty-five more that have not. A complete list can be seen on the bulletin board in the hallway by the church office, along with a list of the countries that have not yet ratified.

Caring for our Church Family

Ministry of Visitation

Dear Friends,

One of the important ministries of the church is ministry to the sick. The little Book of James says: “Are any among you suffering? They should pray. Are any cheerful? They should sing songs of praise. Are any among you sick? They should call for the elders for the church and have them pray over them, anointing them with oil in the name of the Lord” (*James 5:13-14*)

At **HBPres** we take the words of James seriously. How do we try to minister to the sick and those in need? Let us count the ways:

- Each person in the congregation is assigned a Deacon who stays in touch about needs concerns.
- Our Stephen Ministers reach out to those who have special needs.
- A dedicated group of visitors check hospitals every day so that anyone who is in the hospital should receive a visit each day from a church member.
- Our Parish Associate, Bill Williamson, is primarily involved in visiting the hospitals, nursing homes and those at home.
- An attendance committee tracks those who attend worship and identifies names of those who have been absent for a length of time.

That’s what the church does. Now we need your help. If you know of someone who needs a visit or another kind of contact with the church, please call the church office, 896-1791. If you are in personal need of such a visit, please call. We cannot respond to what we do not know.

The great desire of the staff at **HBPres** is to respond to the needs of the members of the church. James says such a responsibility belongs not just to some, but to all. The ministry of visitation is important, and works well. Let’s work together to make it even better.

Book III - Finding Hope and Healing is sent 6 months after a loss

Book IV - Rebuilding and Remembering is sent 11 months after a loss

Each short booklet focuses on what a person is likely to experience during that point in the grieving process. They offer understanding, empathy, compassion and hope.

HBPres sends these helpful books via Stephen Ministry to our members who have experienced the loss of a loved one.

Meet Our Mission Workers – *Jeff and Christie Boyd*

Third in a series

HBPres helps support several Presbyterian Church (USA) mission workers. One such couple is Jeff and Christie Boyd, mission co-workers in the Democratic Republic of the Congo. Jeff serves as the PC(USA)'s regional liaison for Central Africa, Christie as a facilitator for women and children's interests.

In his role as regional liaison, Jeff facilitates support for the relationships, programs and activities of PC(USA) partners in the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Cameroon and Equatorial Guinea. He also resources other PC(USA) mission personnel and helps connect partner churches with PC(USA) congregations that want to be involved in ministry in that region.

Besides the Congo, Christi works in three other French-speaking African countries: Madagascar, Niger and Rwanda, and one non-French-speaking country, South Sudan. She accompanies global partners as they seek to remedy the marginalization of women and children in their communities and engages with Presbyterian constituencies in the U.S. that wish to come alongside and promote those efforts.

Most of the countries where Jeff and Christi work are rich in natural resources but only a small and powerful segment of the population benefits from the revenues they produce. Poverty is rampant, educational access limited and disease widespread. The wealth created by the abundant natural resources often fuels regional conflicts that exacerbate the vulnerability of women and children to cultural and gender-based violence.

Jeff, a native of California, is a former math teacher with more than two decades of experience as an educator in the United States, Pakistan and Africa. Though trained as a physical therapist, Christi, who was born in the Netherlands, has longstanding experience bringing people together to address root causes of hunger and poverty. Since arriving in Africa in 1990, the Boyds have lived in Tanzania, Cameroon and now Congo for the second time. Members of Crescent Hill Presbyterian Church in Louisville, they are the parents of three grown children, Matthias, Salome and Naomi.

How Many Hungry People?

from “Bits & Bites” Hunger Newsletter; Evelyn Vaughn PC(USA)

The United Nations’ Food and Agriculture Organization estimates about 805 million of the 7.3 billion people in the world, or one in nine, were suffering from chronic undernourishment in 2012-2014. Almost all the hungry people, 791 million, live in developing countries representing 13.5 percent or one in eight of the population of developing countries. There are 11 million people undernourished in developed countries.

The target set by the Millennium goals was to reduce by half the proportion of hungry people by 2015. This goal will almost be reached. As the table reveals, East Asia, Southeast Asia, and Latin America & the Caribbean regions have met the goal.





ADULT SUNDAY SCHOOL - 9:45 - 10:45 a.m.

In the Barrett Room:

April 12, 19 & 26 – The Book of Jonah: A Whale of a Tale. Scott Doelling will facilitate a three-week deep dive into the world's most famous fish story. We'll cross stormy seas, visit exotic foreign lands and get up close and personal with amazing wild animals, all in the company of one of the most unique prophetic voices of the Old Testament. Most of us learned this story way back in our earliest Sunday school days and few of us have given it a second thought since. Viewed from a fresh perspective, you just might be surprised by what you know, what you don't know and what you only think you know.

May 3, 10 & 17 – Beyond the Worship Wars. Tom Long in his book, *Beyond the Worship Wars*, found that many churches have been struggling with the issue of styles of worship. Many have found the struggle to be divisive while others have been able to move beyond division and become vital and faithful congregations. The marks of those vital and faithful congregations include making room somewhere in worship for the experience of mystery; making planned and concerted efforts to show hospitality to the stranger; recovering and making visible the sense of drama inherent in Christian worship; emphasizing congregational music that is both excellent and eclectic in style and genre; creatively adapting the space and environment of worship; forging a strong connection between worship and local mission—a connection expressed in every aspect of the worship service; maintaining a relatively stable order of service and a significant repertoire of worship elements and responses that the congregation knows by heart; moving to a joyous festival experience toward the end of the worship service and having strong, charismatic pastors as worship leaders. Join us for this discussion!

Sabbath & Smartphones: A Bible Study. Bill Williamson will lead this course based on Walter Brueggemann's book, *Sabbath as Resistance: Saying NO to the CULTURE OF NOW*. 
