## “In or Out?”

On Monday a few weeks ago, I walked out of the office to go to lunch. One of our members was also getting in her car to leave. She pointed at the entrance to the back of Owen’s parking lot and asked if the chain was down. I looked and, indeed, the chain was down, but it was still locked. Someone had run over it, pulling out one of the posts that holds the chain nearly to the ground. I told Tim, our custodian, about the situation and he just shook his head. “What are people thinking?” he asked.

So I began to do a bit of exegesis on his question. Did they run over the chain trying to get out of our parking lot or into our parking lot? Did they run over it on purpose because they did not think there should be a chain there? Did they run over it because they were in too big a hurry to turn around and go back to Shelbyville Road? Did they give even a thought as to how expensive it is going to be for us to repair the damage? Was it someone like me whose eyes are not what they used to be and who simply did not see the chain? One thing is certain, he or she was not thoughtful enough to leave a note with a phone number or stop by the office and tell us what had happened and take responsibility.

Sadly, there seems to be a lot of that going around these days. We not only act before we think but after we act, we are unwilling to take responsibility for our actions.

In July, I preached on the story of the Good Samaritan from Luke Chapter 10. When we carefully read the story, we realize that not only

did the Samaritan bind the injured man’s wounds but he also took him to the inn and told the inn keeper that whatever additional cost was incurred he would come back and cover. He was a second mile person; he did not just go with the man one mile, but two. Christians are called not only to take responsibility for their own mistakes but to even help those who, by their own fault or the fault of others, wind up in need.

If people who are outside the church by choice knew that people on the inside showed this kind of character, would they be running over the chain to get out or to get in? It just might be the latter.


## About that Cross and Garden

Like the new sign in front of the church, which wound up taking six months instead of six weeks, the cross sculpture and memorial garden are taking a bit longer than we had hoped. Both are in progress, however, and we expect to see them—if not completed at least well under way—before we conclude our centennial celebration later this year.

The accompanying site layout and landscape plan show what the garden will look like. We have been awaiting final approval of our drainage plan from the Metropolitan Sewer District. We now have that and construction of the garden may well have started by the time you read this newsletter.

Artist Guy Tedesco has been hard at work building a scale model of the sculpture but has been delayed by, of all things, a glass shortage. The sculpture, as you know, will be made of glass and bronze and will resemble the beautiful cross that Guy created for our sanctuary.

So have faith a little longer. And if you have not yet made a gift or pledge in support of this project, please consider doing so. The cross and the garden will be permanent expressions of Harvey Browne's commitment to Jesus Christ and of God's magnificent creation. Help make this gift to St. Matthews a reality.




## "Beyond the Pulpit" Seeks Racial Understanding

A gathering that calls itself "Beyond the Pulpit" has been meeting to consider how to bring people of different races together. The group includes members from Shawnee Presbyterian Church, a predominantly African-American church in West Louisville, and members from Harvey Browne. Sally Craxton of Harvey Browne and Dianne White of Shawnee are co-conveners of the group.

Shawnee and Harvey Browne have enjoyed a strong relationship for many years. Each year the two pastors, Ron Robinson and John Roper, preach in the other's church. Now the group wants to move "Beyond the Pulpit" to consider ways for people from both churches, as well as others in our community, to work together.

The group is planning a major event to take place this fall (date yet to be determined) where participants will have a chance to meet and discuss how we can make our community safer and more inclusive. Be watching for information about this important upcoming event.

## Kentucky Refugee Ministries

Kentucky Refugee Ministries (KRM) has a new program called Cultural Exchange. It only requires about an hour a week and offers an easy way to help a refugee adjust to a new life and also improve their English. It involves meeting with him or her in their home and through conversation and other activities, games, etc. giving them an opportunity to practice English with a native speaker.

## Recycling Facts: Glass

- Glass can be recycled and re-manufactured an infinite number of times and never wear out.
- Making glass from recycled material cuts related water pollution by 50%.
- Recycling just one glass jar saves enough electricity to light an 11 watt CFL bulb for 20 hours.
- More than **28 billion glass bottles and jars** end up in landfills every year – that is the equivalent of filling up two Empire State Buildings every three weeks.
- A modern glass bottle would take 4000 years or more to decompose – and even longer if it's in the landfill.
- Mining and transporting raw materials for glass produces about 385 pounds of waste for every ton of glass that is made. If recycled glass is substituted for half of the raw materials, the waste is cut by more than 80%. (Recycling Facts: Recycle Across America)

Sept. 19	<i>All the King's Men</i> by Robert Penn Warren	Nancy Pollock	This 1946 classic novel about the power and corruption of politics won the Pulitzer Prize. It may well be the best novel ever written about politics in America. It still speaks to us today, though be warned that it is in the language of the 1930s and 1940s.
Oct. 19	<i>The Millionaire And the Bard: Henry Folger's Obsessive Hunt for Shakespeare's First Folios</i> by Andrea E. Mays	Juergen Tossmann	We join the community in celebrating Shakespeare's 400 <sup>th</sup> anniversary as The Frazier History Museum displays one of the first folios (printed booklets of Shakespeare's plays) from the Folger Library from November 10 to December 10. Juergen will discuss this fascinating book about what we know and don't know about Shakespeare and about how one man dedicated his life to obtaining first folios of Shakespeare's plays and then built a library in Washington D.C. to hold all the items he had collected.
Nov. 16	<i>Circling the Sun</i> by Paula McLain	Diana Stephen	Beryl Markham, an early woman aviator, is brought to life through this historical fictional Account. We are caught up in the tales of Beryl's adventures in colonial Kenya of the 1920s, which influenced her passion and boldness.
Jan. 18	<i>All the Light we Cannot See</i> by Anthony Doerr	Ginny Copenhefer	Two teenagers during WWII lead very different lives—a blind girl in Paris and a brilliant boy in Germany. A story of familial love and courage, and two young people caught in a war they did not wish to join, is told in this Pulitzer Prize winning novel, which was a best seller.
Feb. 15	<i>Still Life</i> by Louise Penny	Wilma Bennett	It's Thanksgiving Sunday and Jane Neal is dead. Her friends assume that her surprising death is the result of a hunting accident. However, Chief Inspector Armand Gamache thinks Jane's death is quite possibly murder. Join in the discussion as we meet our new friends from Three Pines village, Quebec Province, Canada. If you read any subsequent books by Louise Penny, these new friends will reappear.
March 15	<i>Home and Beyond: An Anthology of Kentucky Short Stories</i> Edited by Morris Allen Grubbs	Sarah Grant	This book includes 40 short stories written between 1945 and 2000 by Kentucky authors. Many of them will be old friends; some may be brand new to you. Read one or more, or all the stories, or come with your own favorites. We can enjoy sharing and discussing what we enjoy about short stories.

We will be involving other leaders beside Kim Cabrera and Terry Hargrave throughout the year. For example, Tim Cargal will lead a 3 week segment on the Old Testament and Bill Williamson might lead the New Testament segment in the spring. John Roper may lead the sessions on Jesus and Ben Blake might lead lessons on the Holy Spirit. It will be an exciting class for all who are involved!

#### **HIGH SCHOOL CLASS**

A branch of the thoughtfulchristian.org: ***INFORMED***. These sessions for older youth are taken from an on-line resource center for bible studies, topic based studies and every day discussions such as: bullying, peer pressure, alcohol and drug abuse among others. These sessions explore relevant matters in a theological, yet simplified manner. Adolescence is a time of identity formation and these studies help older youth explore who they are as Christians and who they are as children of God living in a chaotic world.



## Kroger Community Rewards

### Re-enrollment in August – Support Our HBPres Youth

If you are currently enrolled in the Kroger Community Rewards program, you must re-enroll this month to continue supporting the **HBPres** youth program. You should receive an e-mail in early August from Kroger directing you to re-enroll with just a couple of clicks. However, you will not receive an email if you specified that you did not want to receive e-mails from Kroger when you enrolled originally.

If you do not receive an e-mail from Kroger, please go to the [Kroger.com/community](http://Kroger.com/community) rewards website and “sign-in” to your account with your e-mail address and your password. Once in your account, look for a button to re-enroll, which will ask you to confirm if you want to continue supporting the **HBPres** Youth Program. Click “re-enroll” or pick “Harvey Browne Presbyterian Youth Program” as the organization you want to support. If you don’t remember your password click on “Forgot Your Password.” By entering your e-mail address, you will be able to reset your password, log-in, and re-enroll in the program.

The Kroger office which supports the KCR program indicated the process will be self explanatory, but they could not confirm the exact wording before this Newsletter was printed.

There are 125 families currently supporting the **HBPres** youth by earning cash rewards each time their Kroger Plus card is scanned. Please continue this effort by re-enrolling in August. If you do not re-enroll in August, you will need to enroll as a new participant in this program beginning September 1. Anyone not currently enrolled can do so after September 1.
