
One Last Gift

The Session of **HBPres** would like to thank the congregation for your support and to all the volunteers who work hard for the church to carry out its:

Vision Statement

Harvey Browne Church is a community of Believers that glorifies God and Honors tradition as it seeks new ways of growing in faith, sharing our beliefs and putting our faith into practice.

Purpose Statement

HBPres is called to make a difference by making disciples who faithfully follow Jesus, study the Bible, and love one another by serving our neighbors.

The following business was handled by Session in 2015:

- Approved communion schedule for 2015 and commissioning Stephen Minister to serve communion.
- Approved increasing the distribution of each of the Endowment Funds from 4% to 5%.
- Approved the 2015 Operating Budget.
- Approved reducing the number of Session members from 22 to 15 Ruling Elders. A smaller Session can develop a more efficient and cohesive relationship in order to serve as the spiritual leaders of the church.
- Approved changing Sunday worship from 3 services to 2 services; 9:00 and 11:00. There were logistical difficulties with Sunday School, 3 services and music rehearsals all in one morning.
- Approved the wedding of Rev Adam Fischer and Rev Meg Flannigan on My 10, 2015 during 11:00 worship.
- Approve the wedding of Mary Oxford and Gary Earley-Jones (grandson of Al & Myra Earley) on June 13, 2015. Gary's grandfather, Rev. Dr. Walter Davis, professor emeritus at San Francisco Seminary will officiate.
- Session designated two Session members to recruit a team to co-ordinate Special Events/Fundraisers and one of those elders will continue to serve as the initial chair of the team. The Special Events Team is charged with the task of hosting fundraising events for mission with at least 3 events per year and exploring the institution of a Farmers' Market during the winter months. Special Events Team will now be a part of Spiritual Formation Committee. All fundraisers with designation of mission to be benefited will be approved by Session.
- Nominated Wilma & Fred Bennett to recognized by Mid-Kentucky Presbytery for adults 70+ years old who have contributed much to **HBPres** and Mid-KY Presbytery.
- Approved the following to the office of Ruling Elder: Sharon Murphy, Carol Tinkle, Kathy Williams, Gabe Wood, Jennifer Hoert, and Katie Stewart.
- Approved the hiring of a contractor to update first floor hallway walls and lights while staying with the \$35,000 budget approved from the Vivian Barber bequest.
- Approved Jackie Dolin as **HBPres** Treasurer. The Treasurer will now be a member of Support Committee as a financial liaison.
- Approved Anne Hughes as Clerk of Session.

- Approved Marianne Humphries as Elder Commissioner to Presbytery meetings.
- Concurred with the request of Rev. Adam Fischer to Mid-Kentucky Presbytery that his pastoral relationship with Harvey Browne Memorial Presbyterian Church be dissolved in order for him to accept a call from First Presbyterian Church of Baldwin, NY; Presbytery of Long Island.
- Approved a **HBPres** Centennial Campaign in the amount of \$465,000 with its kick off in September 2015. The campaign will include costs for outside cross, memorial garden & sign, new roof, replenish facilities reserve fund, elevator repair, costs for Centennial Celebration, and a mission portion for Habitat for Humanity.
- Approved a covenant agreement between Harvey Browne Memorial Presbyterian Church and Louisville Korean Presbyterian Church.
- Dealt with the issue of missing funds from our bank account by our former business manger. The amount of these funds have been repaid in full. The Session would like to thank Cheryl Granger, Penny Stewart, Ben Blake, and Maggie Chilton for their work in resolving this issue.
- Approved changes proposed by Support Committee for sorting and counting offerings collected on Sundays.
- Approved Sunday worship times to be 8:30 and 11:00. Plans are in the works for a youth/ young adult worship service on Saturday nights.
- Welcomed 7 new members and approved 11 baptisms.

Centennial Happenings

Our Centennial Hymn

Sing to the Lord with Joyful Voice was selected as our Centennial Hymn because it was written in 1916, the year our church was founded, and is a setting of Psalm 100, which inspired our Centennial theme, “Sharing God’s Love, Generation to Generation.” The hymn tune, JERUSALEM, was composed by Sir Charles Hubert Hastings Parry (1848-1918), a noted British composer. It is well known in England with its original text by William Blake, “And did those feet in ancient times.” This setting is the unofficial hymn of the United Kingdom, equivalent to our *America the Beautiful*. The first two verses are by Isaac Watts (1674-1748), a British minister, whose hundreds of hymns, including *Joy to the World*, *My Shepherd Will Supply My Need* and *When I Survey the Wondrous Cross*, have been staples in Protestant worship.



The third verse was composed for our Centennial Celebration by The Rev. David Gambrell, associate for worship in the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) Office of Theology and Worship and author of more than a dozen hymns. The words reflect not only our Centennial theme, but also our mission statement: “To make **HBPres** a congregation that honors the past as we seek new ways to grow in faith, share our beliefs and put our faith into practice, that by doing so we will glorify God and show our love for one another.”

Here is David’s interpretation:

Come, sing and share repeats the first words of the Isaac Watts stanzas.

Share the love of God reflects our Centennial theme.

Let every word and deed proclaim reflects the part of our mission statement that calls us to share our beliefs and put our faith into practice.

The mighty things that God has done reflects the part of our mission statement that calls us to honor the past.

The gift of life in Jesus’ name reflects the part of our mission statement that calls us to share our beliefs.

This is our hope, this is our faith reflects the part of our mission statement that calls us to seek new ways to grow in faith.

From age to age, this is our call reflects our Centennial theme.

To show the glory of the Lord reflects the part of our mission statement that seeks to glorify God.




Men's Group

HBPres University Winter Term Offerings

A Survey of Our Roots: As part of the Centennial Year, the winter term of HBU will offer a survey of our roots including the elusive Harvey Browne, the invisible Hugh Barret, the extensive contents of our church archives, and the exhausting conflicts of Presbyterians since they settled in Kentucky. Join us in the Session Room January 3 – 24.

Mariners Class: This class will join the Centennial class for the first four weeks of Winter Term. For the last two weeks, February 14 & 21, the Mariners will be led by Jim Lewis and his topic is: "Religion in America—what the polls can tell us and what they can't." As they report on the current state and future prospects of religion in American life, journalists often cite polls on American religion, such as Pew's 2014 U.S. Religious Landscape Study. What do these polls tell us about current American religious life? To what extent are the polls useful? What are their limits? The class meets in the Living Room.

Reformed Theology in a Sentence: When people described central theological distinctives of the Reformed tradition of which Presbyterians are a part, they sometimes refer to the "five points of Calvinism." In fact, these distinctives can be expressed in the single sentence: "If God desires to save us, God cannot fail." This class will explore the history of the "five points of Calvinism" and unpack their contribution to that single sentence. Tim Cargal will be leading these classes in Room 209.


