Session Approves 9:00 and 11:00 Sunday Worship

Acting upon a recommendation from the Worship and Music Committee, the Session has approved having two Sunday worship services beginning on September 13.

The Chapel Service will meet in the Chapel at 9:00 a.m. and will be a less formal worship opportunity for all ages featuring a participatory liturgy and contemporary music.

The Sanctuary Service will meet in the Sanctuary at 11:00 a.m. and will have diverse music and liturgy that engages the worshipping community in a setting reflecting the beauty and mystery of our faith.

THE FUTURE OF WEDNESDAY NIGHT MINISTRY

Our Mid-week meal and ministry programs are very important to this congregation and the Louisville community and Wednesday nights are not just about eating and fellowship. Wednesday Night Kitchen Ministry is the focal point of our evening and there wouldn't BE a meal without it. We did things differently last year and although we got through it, it wasn't always smooth sailing. This is why we need to do some serious planning. Everyone expresses so much positive feedback in supporting this outreach but when it comes down to the actual implementation, work is needed.

On Sunday, August 2nd after 10:00 worship, there will be an open forum in room 206 where new ideas/approaches can be explored. We will be discussing the future of Wednesday Night meals and ministry.

Session Approves Centennial Campaign

Campaign to include exterior cross, memorial garden and sign plus outreach and maintenance projects

HBPres will celebrate its 100th birthday in 2016. The celebration will begin this fall and include many components that will not only highlight our past but also engage our congregation in envisioning our next hundred years. To commemorate this historic occasion the Session last month approved plans for a capital campaign that will include construction of a 20-foot cross in front of the church surrounded by a 14,000-square-foot memorial garden.

The centennial cross and garden will symbolize a century of ministry and mission to St. Matthews and beyond. The cross, designed by artist Guy Tedesco and modeled after the beautiful cross he created for the Sanctuary, will be a testament to our faith in Jesus Christ and will extend the beauty of our worship space into the surrounding community. The garden will be a setting of natural beauty where people can sit, read, meditate, pray and honor their loved ones. Our church is named in memory of Dr. Harvey Browne. What more fitting way to commemorate our centennial than to create a place where those who have been part of our faith community can also be remembered.

The cross and garden will serve a more practical purpose as well. Our church lost a key part of its identity a number of years ago when, after repeated unsuccessful efforts to stop the roof from leaking above the Sanctuary, we were forced to remove the church's steeple. Since then **HBPres** has been something of an invisible presence, having little in front of our building that lets people know we are a church except for a small, aging sign with our name and the seal of the Presbyterian Church (USA). Hundreds of people pass by each day with little clue as to what happens behind our big brick wall. How much better would it be if the front of our building announced to the world that we are place where God's grace abounds, where seekers can explore their faith and believers can put their faith into practice?

The new cross—the universal symbol of our Christian faith—will become our steeple on the ground. It will reflect the colorful design of our Sanctuary cross and, like it, will consist of dozens of individual crosses of various sizes. Each cross will be made of solid glass and attached to a bronze structure designed to withstand nature's elements. As with the interior cross, the design will reflect the fact that we are individuals who together form a community of faith. And as was done in creating the Sanctuary cross, church members will have an opportunity to help create the new exterior structure.

In addition to the cross and memorial garden, the capital campaign will raise money for a new sign along Browns Lane, a new roof for our aging building (the newest part of which was built in the 1980s) and a new elevator for the one that is currently broken outside of Emory Hall. The campaign will include an outreach component to benefit Habitat for Humanity, an organization with which **HBPres** has had a partnership for 25 years. Financial constraints have forced us to reduce our annual contribution to Habitat in recent years; this campaign will enable us to restore some of that funding. The campaign will also enable us to replace money borrowed from the church's Facilities Reserve Fund last year in order to balance the 2014 operating budget and provide a small amount of money to help pay for our centennial celebration.

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The amount needed to accomplish these things is \$465,000. The campaign will launch this fall as part of our centennial celebration, the theme of which will be *Sharing God's Love, Generation to Generation*. Be watching for more information. HBPres Invites Korean Congregation to Share Space and Ministry

For several years, Louisville Korean Presbyterian Church, the Taiwanese Presbyterian Church and Calvin Presbyterian Church have shared space at Calvin's location on Rudy Lane. With the impending sale of the Calvin property, the Korean congregation has been searching for a new home that would allow more options to expand their mission and ministry. The session of **HBPres** recently approved inviting our Korean sisters and brothers to move their church to our location, sharing space that is not fully utilized by our ministries and programs.

In their present location, Louisville Korean must hold their worship services at 12:30 p.m. followed by community meal, a cultural tradition among Korean congregations. The later start meant their services did not conclude before 2:00 p.m. "It has been difficult for our church to attract younger families with the services carving out a large portion of the day," said interim pastor, Tae Su Cheong (who says, "Just call me Pastor T").

The preliminary plan is that Louisville Korean will use the chapel at 11:00 a.m. followed by their community meal in Eline Hall after worship. They also will need classroom space at 9:30 a.m. (three for adult Christian education and one for small children). Their middle and high school youth will mostly likely join Harvey Browne's youth classes and activities. Their pastoral staff will also have office space in the chapel area.

In all the discussions between the sessions and pastoral staff, one theme has been clear. Neither church is viewing this as simply a "rental agreement" but rather a covenant to join in ministry, sharing Christ's message of love to all God's people. God has blessed our church with faithful leaders – past and present – who have provided for our needs. Almost 100 years ago, Crescent Hill Presbyterian gave birth to what became Harvey Browne. Now our congregation can provide an opportunity for new life to a sister church, helping spread Christ's mission to a broader community. "This has been a God thing from the start," said Pastor T. "Just at the moment we felt our ministry might be in jeopardy, God has opened a new door and a more promising future. Thanks be to God!"

Our new Korean sisters and brothers plan to have their first worship service in the chapel on July 5th with a joint worship celebration with our congregation at a later date.

HBPres Personnel Update

The recent untimely death of our longtime business manager, Beverly Quick, and the departure of our associate pastor, Adam Fischer, to accept of a call to a church in New York have left two very large holes in our staff that have had the Personnel Committee working overtime to help us move forward. We want to report on the steps we have taken and what lies ahead.

With help from some church members who have volunteered their service, our administrative assistant, Cheryl Granger, has taken over many of Beverly's responsibilities. Our administrative assistant, Tina Mosley, has taken on some additional duties as well. Cheryl will be attending the annual meeting of the National Association of Church Business Administration next month, an interdenominational organization that exists to promote the highest level of professional competence among people serving churches in administrative roles. At that meeting she will begin a process that will lead to her becoming a certified church administrator.

Our associate pastor, Kim Cabrera, has also taken on added responsibilities including most of Beverly's supervisory duties plus oversight and planning of the children's Sunday school. She will also assume Adam's role as staff liaison to the Spiritual Formation and Outreach committees.

The Personnel Committee will be keeping a close eye on the office workload to see if additional staff is needed—either part- or full-time—and whether some work might be done by volunteers.

With regard to Adam's position, the committee will be taking a two-step approach. The first step will be to find someone who can lead the youth program in the coming year. The committee expects to have the person on board by August 1. The second step will focus on our church's long term needs and will include an evaluation of our staffing structure in light of our current needs, our hopes for the future and current budget realities. Church members will have opportunity for input as this process unfolds.

HBPres has been blessed over the years with strong, dedicated leaders, who have helped lead our church on a rich spiritual journey. Like so many churches these days, we find ourselves in uncertain and occasionally unsettling times. We ask you to join us in praying for God's continued guidance as we make the decisions that lie before us.

Last year, **HBPres** became part of the new Kroger Community Rewards Program. Our last quarterly check showed we have 124 **HBPres** youth supporters—That’s you!—that have linked their card to “Harvey Browne Presbyterian Youth Program.” That is a significant increase over the number of families who participated in the old program and it is partly because the new program is so much easier than remembering to reload your gift card before making purchases.

With the new program, you enroll your card once a year and that’s it. But all participants must re-enroll in August for a new year beginning September 1.

Kroger has not yet provided the detailed steps for re-enrollment, so please make a note to check the August newsletter and the *Good News to Go* in late July for specific instructions. Please mention this requirement to others you know who are currently participating and ask other family members who shop at Kroger if they would be willing to support our youth as well.



Below are the roles we need with a brief description to help you decide where you can help.

Outie Area (outside Hopkins Hall)

Outie Co-Director: Works side by side with the Outie Director to help recruit, plan and facilitate the retreat. The Co-Director will be the director for the next year's retreat.

Small group leader: works with Adrienne Early, SG Coordinator. The SGL is an integral part of the Do In experience. As a SGL, you will facilitate discussion among a group of 5-8 youth. You will be provided a manual for reference as well as training and review (will be in mid-August).

Cabin counselor: responsible to sleep in the cabins with youth; make sure they are at activities on time; assist with recreation and crafts and lead Friday evening vespers.

Recreation/activity leaders: Responsible for on the Friday evening recreation, Saturday Do In surprise, helping youth lead energizers prior to keynote and/or worship, and planning the mini-competitions before meals to determine meal order.

Registration: Leads the Friday evening check in to ensure all paperwork and payments are received, medication is turned in with administration instructions and any electronic devices and keys are turned in.

Photographer: responsible for taking pictures throughout the weekend and making them available in digital format to the technology group for slide shows and future use by **HBPres**.


