Life Alerts

Do you ever wish that you could have alerts set for your life, much like you set them on your smart phone to remind you of meetings? I was thinking about us leaving for vacation and suddenly I had a cold chill. I remembered that last year the day before we were to leave, we realized water had leaked into our basement after a number of Spring rains. Two of our neighbors jumped in to handle the crisis, which allowed us to still leave for vacation on time. One of them told me about the stopped up drain in our yard that was the source of the problem. "Remember, John," he told me with a smile on his face, "you need to clean this out regularly or this will happen again."

I went rushing out into my yard last week just before one of those torrential rain storms to clean that drain for only the second time since last year. It's amazing how once something is no longer a crisis; it just slips off our radar. Then suddenly something jars us and the alarm goes off and we do something we should have been doing all along.

I started thinking of all the other things I had let slip off my radar. As a result of that "life review" I started reading through the Bible again. I told my wife I loved her and I sent a get well card to a friend who recently was diagnosed with cancer. I started praying every night for all the things for which I was thankful.

It's rather frightening how many things that are very important so easily fade from view as the "urgent" pushes them into the background.

At our June session meeting, I became acutely aware that your comments at our congregational coaching sessions were really reminders of what we had allowed to be crowded out by the urgent. You said we need to do a better job with children and youth. You said we need to add some "zing" to our worship. You said we need to do fewer things and do them better. You said we need to evaluate our staff and see if it is doing the things we need done. You said we need to take risks that move us beyond the "way things have always been."

The session is developing action plans that we believe will address these concerns and more. In the Fall, we will be sharing them with the congregation. I am excited about this process because I see the Holy Spirit at work in it. I believe you will see the Spirit at work in it as well.





Notes From Session

HBPres Vision Statement

Harvey Browne Church is a community of believers that glorifies God and honors tradition as it seeks new ways of growing in faith, sharing our beliefs and putting our faith into practice.

HBPres Purpose Statement

HBPres is called to make a difference by making disciples who faithfully follow Jesus, study the Bible, and love one another by serving our neighbors.

The Session of **HBPres** met on Tuesday June 7, 2016 for a stated meeting. Following a devotional led by Marty Cundiff, the following business was handled:

- Cynthia Frenz gave the report from the Board of Deacons.
- Voted to approve using \$11,000.00 of the 2015 budget surplus to replace the church's aging computer server. The total surplus was \$58,268.50. **HBPres** is borrowing \$17,663.89 from this surplus to balance the 2016 budget. The \$11,000 is a one-time expense.
- Peggy Hinds worked with the Session on our "SMART" goals. During the May Session retreat, the Session chose five areas around which to create action plans, long- and short-term, which we feel are important for the future of **HBPres**. The areas are Mission Outreach, Worship, Communication, Christian Education, and Children and Youth. Each small group assigned to these areas reported on their work so far. Peggy Hinds gave us insight on setting goals. Each group will meet and report with goals at the August 2 Stated Session Meeting.

Stated Clerk's Top Ten 222nd GA Issues

The 222nd General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) will consider more than 500 items of business submitted by presbyteries, synods, special committees and commissions, and General Assembly-related agencies and other entities. Here's my "Top Ten" – by level of importance if not controversy:

- **Election of the Stated Clerk:** The Assembly will elect just the fifth Stated Clerk since reunion in 1983 (William P. Thompson, James E. Andrews, Cliff Kirkpatrick, and Gradye Parsons). The search committee has nominated J. Herbert Nelson, currently director of the Office of Public Witness in Washington. He is being challenged by David M. Baker, stated clerk/communications director for Tampa Bay Presbytery.
- **Election of the Co-Moderators:** History will be made as, for the first time since the rules were changed in 2012, both "candidates" for moderator are teams of co-moderator candidates: Jan Edmiston of Chicago Presbytery teamed with Denise Anderson of National Capital Presbytery, both teaching elders; and Ruling Elder David Parker of Salem Presbytery teamed with the Rev. Adan Mairena of Philadelphia Presbytery.
- **Fossil fuel divestment:** San Francisco Presbytery (with concurrence from Mid-Kentucky Presbytery) is proposing that the PC(USA) divest stock in fossil fuel companies. New Covenant Presbytery has submitted three overtures proposing alternatives to divestment. The Mission Responsibility Through Investment Committee is asking for two more years to engage with fossil fuel companies before divestment is considered.
- **The Middle East:** The Advisory Committee on Social Witness Policy has submitted a lengthy report on the prospects for peace between Israel and Palestine and concludes that, because of Israel's ongoing policies of occupation and settlement-building, the "two-state solution" long advocated by the PC(USA) and others is now "difficult, if not impossible."

News from 222nd General Assembly (Cont.)

- **The Confession of Belhar:** The Assembly is expected to give final approval to the inclusion of the Confession of Belhar in the PC(USA)'s constitutional Book of Confessions. Developed by black church leaders in South Africa during apartheid, the confession's themes are racial reconciliation and justice.
- **The new Directory for Worship:** Twelve years in the making, the revised Directory – which was first adopted at Presbyterian reunion in 1983 – “guides sessions, pastors and higher governing bodies (now called “councils”) in planning and conducting worship that is authentically Reformed and culturally appropriate.”
- **Structural realignment:** With membership and financial giving in continual decline, and after several evaluative studies, the Assembly will consider a number of proposals to merge the Office of the General Assembly (the church's ecclesiastical agency) and the Presbyterian Mission Agency (the mission arm). A set of overtures from Foothills Presbytery seeks to change many of the policies and procedures by which the General Assembly operates.
- **Synods:** For the third consecutive Assembly, the role and function of synods will be on the docket. A move to eliminate synods was rejected in 2012. The 2014 Assembly voted to reduce the number of synods to “no more than 8-12.” This year the synods, arguing that they are already evolving more quickly and effectively than other councils of the church, are seeking to have that decision rescinded.
- **Cuba:** Probably the closest partner-church relationship for the PC(USA) is that with the Presbyterian Reformed Church in Cuba (IPRC), the only partner church that was once an organic unit of the denomination (part of the Synod of New Jersey). The Advisory Committee on Social Witness Policy has submitted another lengthy report, outlining the opportunities that lie ahead as the U.S. and Cuban governments normalize relationships.
- **Immigration and race:** Several overtures seek to address the issues of immigration reform, hospitality toward immigrants, modern-day slavery and the plight of African-American males – particularly young black men – in U.S. society.


Pledges Lag Through June

Just as you depend on having enough money to feed your family and pay your bills, **HBPres** depends on its members to provide the money it takes to pay our hard-working staff, pay our bills and support those worthy organizations that are part of our mission outreach.

Through the end of April, we are slightly behind where we need to be in order to do these things.

The budget approved by the Session, based on what members pledged for 2016, anticipated \$365,570.50 in pledges through June 5. We have received \$315,620.22 through June 5, a difference of \$49,950.28.

Hunger, Justice and Earth Care

Our annual yard sale will be held Saturday, August 27 from 8:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. in Eline Hall. Proceeds will be divided between the two PHP projects we funded last spring: Construction of latrines in India (both India and China have national campaigns to improve sanitation in the two countries as this is a major problem for both) and a food security project in Ethiopia which is currently suffering from drought.

Offering of Letters – 222 letters were sent to members of Congress requesting their support for funding to improve nutrition for infants, children and women. Thank you for your participation in helping to prevent malnutrition that leads to infant deaths and physical and mental handicaps.

There are lots of things that can make you feel good about yourself. But something that has always stuck out in my mind is when I go to deliver with my family for the Cabbage Patch. The Cabbage Patch is an organization that helps children and their families that are less fortunate. Our church helps Cabbage Patch by bringing presents and groceries to these families around Christmas time. There is one delivery, in particular, that was more meaningful for me than others. It made me feel like I was actually making someone happier and that, to me, is the best feeling in the world.

It was about two years ago, a couple weeks before Christmas. "We're here for the Cabbage Patch," said my mom. The woman burst into tears. She directed us on where to put everything and we began to bring the gifts and groceries in. Once I had gotten inside the house, I saw how bare it was inside. After about 10 minutes, we had brought everything inside of the house.

It was just about time to leave. The woman thanked us again and again and hugged all of us. She was crying so much it was near to sobbing. I could tell that my mom was near tears too and frankly, so was I. Finally, we said goodbye and got back into the car. As we were driving home, I thought about what we had just done. I knew that we had just made her Christmas better and because of that, my Christmas was better too.

When my family and I deliver for Cabbage Patch, we're being kind, and being kind makes me feel good about myself. It makes me feel like I'm helping someone, and not just helping them up when they've fallen down. The Cabbage Patch makes me feel much more than that, like I'm really making a difference in not only in that family's Christmas, but in the whole world.


