

OUT OF A BROKEN LANDSCAPE

The Thirty Years War (1617-1647) was one of most deadly of all wars in Europe. Millions of people died, not all in battle, but also from disease and horrid living conditions. In the midst of all this, a musician turned Lutheran minister was able to lift his pen out of the gutter of grief and destruction and write the following words:

*Now thank we all our God,
With heart and hands and voices;
Who wondrous things has done,
In whom this world rejoices.
Who from our mother's arms
Has blessed us on our way
With countless gifts of love,
And still is ours today.*

In a recent article in *The Christian Century*, editor Peter W. Marty writes about the author of this text, Martin Rinkart (1586-1649) and shares that Rinkart pastored in the small German town of Eilenburg for twenty eight of those thirty years. During that time he lost not only his wife, but also all the other clergy in the town and the entire town council. Over 8,000 in Eilenburg in one year alone died and Rinkart sometimes preached as many as 200 burial services in one week. These people were not casualties of battle, but of disease and pestilence. Their very own pandemic.



In 1979, the German author Günter Grass wrote, *The Meeting at Telgte*, a short novel about a meeting of intellectuals, authors, poets and musicians near the end of the Thirty Years War who gathered to help write the narrative that would emerge from this most disastrous of times. (Grass himself had participated in a similar collection of writers known as The Group in 1947 — 300 years after the end of the Thirty Years War and for the same purpose of writing narrative out of WWII.)

For the cover of this novel Grass drew a picture of a hand with a pen emerging from a broken landscape.

For Martin Rinkhart, the pen that emerged from the broken landscape are the words of thanksgiving and comfort. Unbelievable that they could come from the hand of a man who had experienced such horrible tragedy and loss.

*O may this bounteous God
In all our life be near us,
With ever joyful hearts
And blessed peace to cheer us;
And keep us in Gods grace,
And guide us when perplexed,
And free us from all ills,
In this world and the next.*

What narrative will emerge from our pandemic? Framed within the temporal dimension of Lent, Holy Week and Easter, ours will be a story of sacrifice, grief and pain. But also of resurrection and new life. Another hymn writer, this one from the 20th century writes:

*Now the green blade rises from the buried grain,
Wheat that in dark earth many days has lain;
Love lives again that with the dead hath been:
Love is come again like wheat arising green. (Hymn #247 in **Glory to God**)*

Maybe the narrative has already been written. We will be resurrected to a new life, a new world and a new chance to show that "love is come again."

The name of the candidate was not given, since it is important to maintain confidentiality until the congregation takes action. The Session voted to call a congregational meeting for the conclusion of worship on Sunday, May 17*. Other members of the PNC are Frank Anderson, Linda Garrett, Adam Zuber, Jim Rissler, and Jonathan Sutphin. Marianne Humphries served on the PNC until her untimely death last December.

NOTES FROM SESSION

HBPres Vision Statement

Harvey Browne Church is a community of Believers that glorifies God and honors tradition as it seeks new ways of growing in faith, sharing our beliefs and putting our faith into practice.

HBPres Purpose Statement

HBPres is called to make a difference by making disciples who faithfully follow Jesus, study the Bible, and love one another by serving our neighbors.

The Session of **HBPres** met, through the technology of Zoom, for a stated meeting on Tuesday, April 7, 2020. Prior to this meeting the session approved, via email, to allow electronic session and congregational meetings. Following devotion by Bill Williamson the following business was handled:

- The Pastor Nominating Committee reported a call has been extended to a candidate for pastor. The call has been approved by the Presbytery's Commission on Ministry. Session approved a congregational meeting be held on May 17 for the purpose of calling a pastor.
- Bill Williamson reported PC(USA) has recommended in house church activities, including worship, be suspended until after May 4**. **HBPres** will concur.
- The following candidates for office of ruling elder gave their statements for faith and were approved by session for ordination and installation: Becky Evans, Laura Krausen, Cason Henderson, Mike Hunter, Marcia Lewis and Claudette Taylor.
- Approved the authorization of the Church Administrator and Chair of Finance Subcommittee, or either of them, to apply for an SBA loan under the Paycheck Protection Program.
- Bill Williamson thanked the ruling elders rotating off session; Maggie Chilton, Betsy Frentz, John Johnson, Keegan Henderson, Margaret Lindsey and Bob Roberts.

NO GUARANTEE OF IMMUNITY

Dear Friends,

One of my favorite Bible stories is the story of Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego. These three men were Jews who believed in the Lord God, but they lived in a foreign land. The king of that country, in an autocratic moment, had a huge statue of himself built, then commanded all the people of the land to gather before the statue and bow down. Anybody who did not bow down, the king's edict said, would be tossed into the fiery furnace. That was all the incentive the people needed, so they obligingly gathered and bowed low to the ground.

Except for these three men. Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego, stood straight and tall and refused to bow down before the king's statue. The king had the three brought before him and explained that if they did not bow down, they were toast. The reply of the three men is remarkable:

O king, we have no need to present a defense in this matter. If our God whom we serve is able to deliver us, he will deliver us from the furnace of blazing fire and out of your hand. But even if he does not, nevertheless we will not serve your gods and we will not worship the golden status that you have set up.

What happened next? Were Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego thrown in the fiery furnace? Did God protect them? I'll leave it for you to find out by reading the book of Daniel, chapter 3.

I am struck by their words: "Even if God does not deliver us, we will not bow down to your statue." The three men know full well that they could be killed, and that there is no guarantee that God will automatically deliver them. Nevertheless, they maintain faith in God, whether God delivers them or not.

In these days of the Coronavirus, there are a few churches that seem to think that God will protect them just because they are believers. And so they assemble in a group for worship against the plea of the governor and other officials. "We're Christian, so nothing can happen to us."

Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego know better. Having faith in God does not exempt us from the things, good and bad, that come in our world. The real issue, whatever comes, is how we will respond to it. As Martin Luther King once said, "The question is not whether we will be spared the trials of this world; the question is how we will act when those trials come."

Having faith in God does not protect us from this epidemic. Like everyone else, people of faith are called to do what others do: wash your hands, practice social distance. One of the gifts God gives us is brains to figure out what to do.

The virus threatens us all, believers and non-believers alike. But God is still Lord, and, come what may, our trust and our faith is in this God and the Christ whom God sent to give us life.

PRESCHOOL NEWS

With so much uncertainty in the world around us during the COVID-19 pandemic, we are uplifted and encouraged by the care and creativity being demonstrated by Harvey Browne Preschool teachers and staff. In the midst of unprecedented social, economic and scholastic interruption, the Preschool has found ways to continue to teach, encourage and support our students and families.

While it is definitely not “business as usual” at the preschool, learning and support has continued through daily Zoom (video conferencing) classes, email support, lessons, weekly music class with Mrs. Williams, and weekly YouTube channel read-alongs with Mrs. Squires.

We recent celebrated "The Week of the Young Child" with every day providing a new focus. Some of the daily themes included: Music Monday, Tasty Tuesday, Work Together Wednesday, Artsy Thursday, and Family Friday.

We wanted to share with everyone some of the fun ideas being sent out to our Preschool families recognizing that even if you do not live with a young child you may know one that this would be fun to share with or to do yourself if it just happens to bring out the child in you. “Tasty Tuesday” ideas can also work anytime! Everyone – especially children can help creating menus, cooking, setting up dining areas for stuffed animals, playing restaurant...the possibilities are endless!

A few healthy snack ideas:

- ◆ **Banana Sushi:** Roll bananas in a nut/soy/sunflower seed butter then roll in different toppings: coconut flakes, mini chocolate chips, sprinkles. Slice to make 'sushi'.
- ◆ **Fruit Kabobs:** Slice up any fruit you have on hand and make kabobs! Kids can pattern the fruit on the kabob stick.
- ◆ **Oatmeal Bites:** Combine 1¼ cup oatmeal, ½ cup nut/soy/ sunflower seed butter, 1 single serve yogurt (4 oz.), 1 tsp. cinnamon. Mix well and shape into balls. Pop in the fridge for a quick, easy snack. You can also omit the yogurt and add honey. You can't mess these up!
- ◆ **Ants on a Log:** Top celery sticks with cream cheese or nut/soy/sunflower seed butter and top with raisins. (An oldie but goodie!)







TSHIABANTU SCHOOL UPDATE

Dollars raised from our Advent Sales (\$1,384.91) have been designated to purchase desks for a program that **HBPres** supports, *Schools in Congo*. Here are some statistics about this specific school. (Information is dated as of September 30, 2019.)

EP Tshiabantu is located in Bipemba Commune, in the city of Mbuji Mayi. This school is the only school in this remote corner of Mbuji Mayi. Other schools are about six kilometers away. Building this school keeps children from this corner from having to travel a long distance. This was approved by the school population which is very important. The environment in which this school is located is a semi-urban environment where more than 70% of the population live in an agricultural environment. Building this school will allow children in this community to study in the right conditions by allowing them to follow the school curriculum as is done elsewhere. This is the reason the Church thought setting up a school in this area — to help children who were left to their own fate. The Church has a structure with nine classes with for grades 1-6 (202 boys, 190 girls, 392 children total).

THE HOLM FAMILY TEMPORARILY RETURNS TO LOUISVILLE

PC(USA) has requested that all mission co-workers with the United States as home-base (U.S. citizens and U.S. permanent residents) return to the U.S. as recommended by the State Department. We had initially stocked up on food and cleaning supplies and planned to shelter-in-place at our home in Mzuzu, Malawi (Africa) for COVID-19. As the situation globally escalated quickly we had to evacuate Mzuzu and return to the USA within days.

We remember that for many around the world this season has been even more difficult as many have seen death and illness. We all face great uncertainty, but we should not give into fear. We trust that our God is faithful to us in challenging times, while we are not promised to be without suffering, we are not alone. Thank you to **HBPres** for lovingly caring for us with food and activities while we are here in Louisville, though on quarantine so you won't actually 'see' us around.* The Furlough Home in the Louisville Presbyterian Theological Seminary campus is comfortable, perfect and peaceful, exactly what we need right now as we stay put on quarantine.
