THE BOTH/AND BEAUTY OF ADVENT

Advent is a strange time. A wonderfully powerful, meaningful, mysterious and beautiful time, to be sure. But a strange time.

On the one hand, Advent is a season where we anticipate the birth of Christ. It is when we open the windows on our Advent calendars and count down the days to Christmas. It is a season of warmth and excitement. Where childlike wonder overtakes even the most Scrooge-like heart. And yet, Advent has another side. It is also a season when we are called to prepare for Christ's return at the end of everything. It is a side that prods into some of our most tender emotions – fear, worry, longing. On the one hand, Advent has us reach back in time to reimagine Christ's birth as if we were right there with the shepherds and angels. But on the other hand, Advent invites us to reach into the future and imagine Christ's glorious return.

If this season feels like a patchwork it is because, in many ways, that is exactly what it is. Rev. Dr. Tom Cheatham wrote recently about the history of Advent. He writes that Advent was only formed in the late 1100s. And the season as we know it represents a coming together of various strands of European Christianity. In the more rural areas of northern and western Europe, which oddly enough were influenced by the Eastern church due to commerce routes, the season was not tied to Christmas, but to Epiphany (January 6th), which was a time when large groups of catechumens would finally be baptized after having gone through 40 days of preparation. It was a time focused on penitence and instruction. It also focused on eschatology, or "the last things" – when Christ's Second Coming would usher in a new realm.

But in Rome, this same time took on a very different character. Epiphany there was not a time of baptismal preparation. Instead, the end of the year was tied to preparations for the newly formed celebration of Christmas which, in the 3rd century, had been set to align with the celebration of the winter solstice. Advent in Rome was a time of joy and celebration.

What we have today represents a coming together of these two strands of Christian tradition. We feel at once longing, but also anticipation; contrition but also joy. In Advent, we liturgically walk in darkness while nonetheless brimming with joy in the light.

It is a season of both/and, not either/or. It can feel strange, but it is also wonderful. Advent invites us to take ourselves out of time as we know it and engage in the profound good news of God-with-us. Whether it is "back then" or "now" or "soon to be" does not matter. That anticipation, that waiting, that hope, that longing – it can all be felt now. Today. And that good news of God-with-us can be anticipated and celebrated today as well.

In this strange, wonderful season, let us prepare the way for God-with-us

HBUNIVERSITY DURING ADVENT

On December 25, 1521 Martin Luther, hero of the Reformation, delivered his annual Christmas sermon based on Luke 2:1-14. Luther's sermon is composed of 78 individually numbered discussion points - it must have lasted for hours. The print-out I have is 22 pages long.

Now fast-forward 444 years to December 9, 1965. Charles Shultz's holiday masterpiece "A Charlie Brown Christmas" premiered on television. Linus Van Pelt spends about 90 seconds reciting the bulk of Luther's gospel text, burning it into our collective consciousness forever.

This year's Advent Reflection series will be based on Luke 2:1-14. We'll look at some of Luther's discussion points, but nowhere near all of them, and maybe see what else Linus might have to say.

Classes will be hosted via Zoom at 2:00 on each of the four Sundays of Advent: Nov. 29, Dec. 6, Dec. 13, & Dec. 20.

PARENTING TOGETHER 21 DAY CHALLENGE

As a Matthew 25 congregation, Harvey Browne Memorial Presbyterian has committed ourselves to focusing on building congregational vitality, eradicating systemic poverty, and dismantling structural racism. This fall the **HBPres** Parenting Together class took a 21 day challenge (<https://hbpres.net/anti-racism-resources/>) to watch, read and listen more on anti-racism with a focus on what we can do from a Christian Family perspective. The idea being to form the habit of having an anti-racist lens through which we can view our world. During our Sunday School time we talked as a group about how the different articles made us feel, and how we can do things differently. It is not easy to examine the persistence of racism within our country, the Church, community, or within ourselves. During our conversations (via Zoom) we may have created some discomfort while being intentional about discussing racism. Heather appreciated the TED Talk by Vernā Myers, *How to Overcome our Biases? Walk Boldly Toward Them*. Myers says, “Biases are the stories we make up about people before we actually know who they are.” Rochelle found the Presbytery of Charlotte Anti-Racism Ministry Team’s letter to be a helpful example of the Church as a leader in dismantling structural racism stating “As a Matthew 25 presbytery, our promise to follow the Prince of Peace demands that we confront racism when we see it, in any form, however subtle or obvious, public or private. To follow Christ’s command to love neighbor as self is to ensure that ALL of our neighbors not only can walk or run down the street without fear for their lives but that they enjoy true equality and equity in our nation’s promise.” The 21-day challenge was a first step in examining our own biases in a conscious and intentional manner. Walk toward your discomfort. We know this is what Jesus would want us to do. We found the 21-day study to be a helpful practice in probing the inescapable structure of racism. Some of us have the option to think of disparity in our society or not. We may choose to attend a two-hour training or march, and then not have to consider the issues until it is convenient again. The practice of daily short reflections prevented us from only considering the structures of racism on our schedule. While it may not have been an enjoyable process and one demonstrating the miles to go before we sleep, the Christian choice is not always the easiest choice and that’s okay.

CHRISTMAS LETTER FROM THE HOLM FAMILY

We came here and you opened your arms widely to our family in March. We had 4 days to pack our bags to travel from our home in Mzuzu, Malawi, to Louisville. The PC(USA) requested that all mission co-workers with the United States as home-base (U.S. citizens and U.S. permanent residents) return to the U.S. as recommended by the State Department. After our initial quarantine period, we thought we might be in Louisville for up to three months. And still after all these months of unknown for our family, we remain in Louisville and loved by Harvey Browne Presbyterian Church through prayers, notes of encouragement, warm clothes (for all of us!), good books, food, and we are also grateful for the masked and socially distanced play dates for Mphatso. Thank you!

Mphatso continues in 1st grade at Breckinridge-Franklin Elementary. It is unclear if moving to online school or moving from a British curriculum to an American school curriculum has been a greater shock, for us all. She recently has been placed in an appropriate instructional level class which has helped. We hope she will be able to remain in virtual instruction until our return to Malawi. For Tyler and Rochelle, our work continues while balancing across 7 hours of time zone difference. Tyler's work at the University of Livingstonia Faculty of Theology, training future pastors, continues especially working with students and their final year research reports. For Rochelle, her work at Mzuzu University Centre of Excellence in Water and Sanitation continues mostly through working with graduate students and a lot of long overdue project report writing.

We are so blessed to be at the Furlough Home on the Louisville Presbyterian Theological Seminary campus, and especially the park to get out (safely) nearly daily as a family. COVID-19 cases are continuing to rise in Malawi with 5,770 known cases reported, but anecdotally we hear it could be much higher as there remains large gaps in testing capacity. We won't be able to return to Malawi until 2021.
