# **GROWING FORWARD**

The transitional period for **HB**Pres pastoral leadership is coming to an end with a new beginning with new leadership by the Rev. Christine Coy Fohr. Thanks to the PNC and many prayers accompanied their hard work bringing Christine on board.

Jesus tells a parable in Matthew 13:33, "The kingdom of heaven is like yeast that a woman took and mixed in with three measures of flour until all of it was leavened." This one-verse parable says it all. Yeast was often considered a symbol of corruption and decay in Jewish tradition, so it would have been shocking for Jesus' audience to hear the kingdom of God to be compared to yeast. His implication seems to be that the new principles of the kingdom of God will challenge traditional views about what is pleasing to God.

We recently had a congregational meeting to approve the terms of call for our new pastor. Due to the social distancing policy, the main concern many expressed was whether we will meet the quorum. We were told that only 10% of total membership is all we needed to meet the quorum. Likewise, for bread to rise, only 1% of yeast is needed to mix with the flour. A small seed of faith and a small portion of yeast can get bigger in the blink of an eye. And Jesus says, the kingdom of heaven is like this.

Like the yeast, the woman in this story is not a favored character in the Bible. In a world dominated by men, the women we see even in the Bible were viewed as secondary or even in a negative light. Yet here, Jesus intentionally lifts up the woman. And it was because what she did with the yeast was an extraordinary thing in the parable. The baking was not for her own family. It was for a huge party for the whole village. The ministry of **HB***Pres* is for everybody. The hope and assurance is that we are in the hands of God and the future is promising.




# RECEPTION FOR CHRISTINE COY FOHR POSTPONED

# PRESCHOOL NEWS

As life in a COVID-19 world continues to force changes in our daily lives, the Preschool is no exception. Constant change seems to have become the new normal.

One thing that has not changed however is Harvey Browne Preschool's passion for the safety and security of all of our children, families, and staff. The preschool has put together an advisory group consisting of health care professionals, staff, and board members to assist in implementing guidelines to work through the logistics of re-opening in the fall. As it appears that regulations from the State will remain in place, we now have more of an idea of what we are working with. Our Director, Amy Squires and team are working hard to meet all the new regulations for the start of this school year.

Temperature/wellness checks will be recorded at the door upon entrance to the building. All teachers and adults will wear masks. Children will not. Multiple classes have been restructured to meet the ten (10) child per class maximum. We will unfortunately not be able to offer an afternoon program except on a very limited basis for our 4 year olds and Kindergarteners.

We appreciate how understanding parents have been with the new regulations that have been put in place and we will continue to keep in touch with our families to ensure that they have the most current school information. At this time we are not registering new families but are adding children to the waiting list.

2020 will certainly continue to be a very interesting and challenging year but we chose to see bright spots. We are very excited that Christine Foy Fohr has accepted the call to serve as Harvey Browne's Senior Pastor/Head of Staff and we are looking forward to working with her. We also look forward to seeing what creative and innovative new lessons and ideas our incredible staff will have for our students in this new environment. And, we look forward to seeing and hearing our bright, smiling, energetic and boisterous students back in the halls of Harvey Browne in the near future.



# HABITAT FOR HUMANITY BUILDS PRESBYTERIAN HOUSE 2020

# HYGIENE KITS FOR PRESBYTERIAN DISASTER ASSISTANCE

Thank you **HB***Pres* for your assistance with items for the Presbyterian Disaster Assistance Hygiene Kits through the grocery cart, preschool, PDO and PW. We were able to provide four completed kits, 54 hand towels, 10 wash-cloths, 5 toothbrushes, 2,047 Band-Aids, 27 combs and 500 nail clippers.

Over the last five years churches in Mid-Kentucky Presbytery—with the assistance from churches in the Ohio Valley, Western Kentucky, and Transylvania Presbyteries, has collected supplies and assembled PDA hygiene kits for victims of disasters. The combined total is nearly 10,000 hygiene kits. The Presbytery of Mid-KY, despite the COVID-19 restrictions in 2020 sent 800 completed hygiene kits from individual groups to the Disaster Assistance Center in Ferncliff, Arkansas. We've also delivered:

- 1000 Ziploc bags and 24 boxes of bags
- 2,577 band-aids and 10 boxes of band-aids
- 1.388 combs
- 917 hand towels.
- 1,176 nail clippers
- 1,327 bars of soap,
- 471 toothbrushes
- 798 wash cloths

## A CALL TO ACTION

The 224<sup>th</sup> General Assembly (2020) of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) addressed the continuing crisis of racism in the U.S. with a resolution and call to action. The Louisville Area Chapter of the National Black Presbyterian Caucus (NBPC) and our local Beloved Community initiative, join with Mid-Kentucky Presbytery to encourage all 50 congregations of Mid-Kentucky Presbytery to join hands and hearts in a two-part call to action.

#### August 25 - October 3, 2020 at noon daily — 40 Days of Prayer

Mid Kentucky Presbytery's congregations and individual members are asked to pause daily at noon for 8 minutes and 46 seconds during the 40 Days of Prayer which begin on August 25 and end on October 3, 2020. The 8 minutes and 46 seconds is the length of time George Floyd endured and finally died under the knee of a Minneapolis police officer. Forty days is a biblically significant number that regularly precedes God's saving activity. You are encouraged to grow your prayer life through daily noontime talks with God. You are asked to lift up individual and corporate concerns along with prayers seeking courage to dismantle structural racism and wisdom for life in a Covid-19 world. Imagine the uplift of over 6,000 Mid-Kentucky Presbyterian voices raised simultaneously to God in prayer.

#### October 4, 2020 at noon — A Witness for Justice

This call to action on October 4 invites congregations and members to become a visible presence in your neighborhood. For 8 minutes and 46 seconds, Mid-Kentucky Presbyterians will be encouraged to gather in front of your particular church buildings, gather in church parking lots, congregate on church lawns, perhaps with signs or banners as Mid-Kentucky Presbytery witnesses – through prayer and presence—our collective commitment to dismantle structural racism. In advance of the Witness for Justice, a downloadable Mid-Kentucky Presbytery resource will be shared with all pastors and clerks of session. This resource will include suggested prayers for the day, a litany, and other resources. Individual congregations are invited to adapt the Witness for Justice to ensure that proper pandemic safety guidelines are met and maintained during the entirety of the action. By witnessing—separately, yet together—we act as one church, one presbytery, one people speaking out for the day when God's justice will roll down like waters, and God's righteousness like an ever-flowing stream.
