My newsletter article comes to you from the shore of Lake Minnetonka, a beautiful spot just West of Minneapolis, Minnesota. My husband has come here every summer of his life, to this spot that his great-grandparents first purchased in 1917. What began as a small cabin turned into a modest home that his grandparents lived in until Rob's parents eventually took up residence here in the summertime. It is calm and quiet (when jet skis don't roll through). It is on a street literally named "Rest Point Road." If Rob could have it his way, he would just sit in his chair pointed toward the lake this whole vacation, watching as our children swim, as boats pass by, and as the sun sets just outside the front door.

Every summer when we come here, it takes me at least four or five days before I reach that place – that place that Rob can find in his chair facing the lake waters. I find myself worrying and stressing, feeling uptight and like I should be doing something. Until eventually, days before we are about to go, I finally let go and give into relaxing and light-heartedness, silliness and joy. And I wonder, every year, why did it take me so long to get to that place?

Brene Brown, in her book *The Gifts of Imperfection* writes about how we can work toward what she calls "whole-hearted living". In her book, she lays out different guideposts, or goals, to work toward, and she plots them out on a spectrum with the goal being on one end and its antithesis on the other. Some of these include Anxiety/Stillness, Comparison/Creativity, and Perfectionism/Self-Compassion, just to name a few. But one – Scarcity/Gratitude and Joy – really hits home. She writes that when we occupy our time stressing and worrying, we undermine our ability to truly experience joy.

She writes, "to celebrate a fleeting moment in time, to fully engage in a life that doesn't come with guarantees – these are risks that involve vulnerability and often pain. But...leaning into the discomfort of vulnerability teaches us how to live with joy, gratitude and grace." In other words, by letting go of our need to control, of our tendency to stress and worry, we allow ourselves to truly experience joy.

In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus talks about just this. He asks, "Can any of you by worrying add a single hour to your span of life?...Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow; they neither toil nor spin, yet even Solomon in his glory was not clothed like one of these." By worrying, he says that we distract ourselves from God's realm, God's kingdom. We miss the gifts and the people around us.

After such a worry-filled, stressful, traumatic year, I pray that we all might find the opportunity to rest, to carve out space, and to care for ourselves. And I pray that we might let go of that worry that can so easily fill our minds. That we might open ourselves to the world outside our windows, noticing the gifts of this world, and be able to greet them with gratitude and joy.

May it be so. Amen.

Update on the Holm Family

From the Holms: We are thankful for our good health and security, we pray that you are all safe as well. Last week we arrived safely to Richland, Washington, and have now finished our quarantine period. We will continue sheltering-in-place and working remotely as we have been the past year while waiting on the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) to develop its policies to allow missionaries to return to their countries of service around the world.

We are grateful that with the prayers of many of you our “sight-unseen” apartment in Richland, Washington, is a good fit for this next season of transition for our family and is at the lower end of price for the area. The short-term lease gives us the time to get back to Malawi. We were very blessed by many in the Tri-Cities who generously helped to furnish and set up our apartment. Thank You!

Prayer requests:

- Please continue to pray for Malawi and COVID-19. Cases the last few weeks have surged, leading to the borders being closed again to travelers, and a partial lockdown returning nationwide with limits on businesses, schools, churches and transportation. The US Embassy suspended operations yesterday due to COVID-19 generated constraints. At Mzuzu University we received news about 7 new cases of students that have tested positive for COVID-19 at the student health clinic.
- For our discernment and wisdom as we wait on returning to Malawi and peace in this time of waiting.
- For Mphatso as she will start a new school in Richland next month, her 3rd school in 16 months. Pray especially for her academic placement testing the week of August 9, that she feels welcome in her new classroom, and for her to make meaningful friends quickly.
- Pray for the country of Malawi, its government, its leaders, its students, its future, and also pray for our local partner the CCAP, and the universities that we work for.
- Please let us know how we can be praying for you!







David moved to Louisville with his adoptive family during his childhood where he attended the Louisville Deaf Oral School and also the woodworking program at Manual High School. David is looking forward to having a home he can call his own after living in apartments for all of his adult life. In particular, because he will be able to get a dog to help him navigate and he will be close to his sister.

On August 22, the special offering for Habitat will be collected. With the additional costs of building materials, the amount to sponsor a home has also increased. Meet future homeowner, David Allen!

David, age 47, has never let life's ups and downs stop him from achieving his dreams. David was born in Florida to a teenage mother and was placed up for adoption at birth. "I was fortunate to match with a family from Michigan but I had to wait to fly home with them until I was a bit older to travel," David shares. "So, for the first few months of my life, I lived in a foster care situation."

When his parents were able to fly him back to Michigan, David quickly settled into life with his new family. His dad worked as an Engineer for Ford and his mom took care of him and his 3 older siblings, who are all adopted as well. One day, when David was 18 months old, him and his siblings were playing the drums with the kitchen pots and pans. "We were all playing and banging on the dishes and my mom noticed that I wasn't reacting or flinching to the loud noises," David recalls. "They took me to the doctor's office and I had my hearing checked and we learned that I was completely deaf." *Continue on next page)*

David's life course completely changed on that day. As he grew up, the family moved to Louisville when his dad learned of his reassignment to the Louisville Ford Truck Plant. David attended the Louisville Deaf Oral School and then for middle school, he lived in St. Louis and attended a boarding school, St. Joseph Institute for the Deaf. For high school, David attended Manual High School and was part of their Vocational School – Woodworking program. “My dad had a woodshop in his leisure time with friends. They would build items like coffee tables and jewelry boxes,” David shares. “My artistic side, and where I get my passion and interest for things like woodworking, drawing and graphic design comes from him.”

Living in a safe and stable home, that he calls his own, has been something David has been striving to achieve for most of his adult life. For many years, he was renting and living in one of his sister's rental homes. And, for the past year, he's been living in a one bedroom apartment. “There's a lot of crime near my apartment complex – there's a lot of stealing, broken windows and abandoned cars,” says David. “I'm ready to put this apartment behind me and invest in a home that's my own and where I actually feel safe.”

David applied to Habitat's homeownership program and was accepted at the beginning of 2021. “I already feel very proud and accomplished for taking this step by applying to the program and then being accepted. I'm looking forward to the stability, the independence, the safety and being comfortable in my own space. My new home will be close to my sister and I'll finally be able to get a dog, who will help me navigate and keep me safe.”

David's new home will be located in the Smoketown neighborhood and will be built in partnership with the Mid-Kentucky Presbyterian Churches. “I call myself an amateur architect from my high school days of woodworking, so I'm looking forward to being a part of the building process,” David shares. “I feel blessed to be partnering with the Churches who are involved in the building of my home. I'm thankful for Habitat and Interpreters, who help me communicate, and all the people in my life who help me out on a daily basis.”

“When I think about the word home, I envision the hanging of pictures on my walls. I'll decorate my home with some of my artwork and with photos of my family and friends. I'm proud to say that through my new home, I'm building a new bridge for myself and my future,” David shares.

As for the first thing David wants to do when he moves in? “I'll probably cut the grass in my new yard. Mowing is one of my favorite things and that hasn't been something I can do lately since living in an apartment.”

The House and Senate have both introduced their own version of a Global Nutrition Resolution. While action taken by the government, beginning at the end of 2019, has helped to reduce hunger in the United States, the number of people experiencing extreme hunger worldwide is predicted by the World Food Program to nearly double to 265 million. The Expanded Child Tax Credit (\$300 per month for children under 6 and \$250 for those aged 7-17) has been passed and will be in effect from now until the end of the year. It is estimated that it could cut child poverty in half.
