

Beware of Call and Text Scams

If you have an email address or a phone, then you have most likely received a message that looks like it is from a friend, colleague, family member or business that states that they need help and are asking for money or gift cards. The messages are not from someone you know but from a stranger that is pretending to be someone you know to try and scam you into giving them money.

The latest version of this scam is to receive a text message on your cell phone from someone pretending to be a person you know and asking for help. Once you reply, they ask if you can buy gift cards for a good cause or to help with a program. The scammer will often state that they are too busy to do it themselves and that they are on a Zoom call and so ask you not to call them. They will then ask you to send you a picture of the back of the gift card or to text them the numbers. You can often tell a scammer from the person they are claiming to be by looking at the phone number or email address. Although the name may match, usually the email and phone number are not the same as the person you call. These text messages can also look like they are coming from a business. According to the Federal Trade Commission, "No real business or government agency will ever insist you pay them with a gift card. Anyone who demands to be paid with a gift card is a scammer."

No staff member at Harvey Browne will ever ask you to purchase a gift card. If you are unsure if the email/text message you receive is real, look up the number in your contacts and call them or call the church office and ask. Scammers want to take advantage of your good nature and know that most people want to be helpful.

From Protect Yourself and Loved Ones from Gift Card Payment Scams (aarp.org):

In a 2022 AARP survey, 1 in 3 adults said they or someone they know had been asked at some point to purchase a gift card to pay a bill, fee or some other debt or obligation or to claim a prize. About one in four adults who were contacted reported they bought the cards, or approximately 13 million U.S. adults ages 18 and older.

Signs to watch for:

- 1. You're directed to buy one or more gift cards often referred to as "electronic vouchers" —as a quick means of making payment.
- 2. You're told to share the numbers on the back of the gift cards, by reading them off or sending a picture.
- 3. The request comes from someone you wouldn't expect to ask for money this way:
 - A Social Security warning of a problem with your account
 - A utility company warning of an imminent shutoff
 - A lottery company promising a big prize once you pay some fees upfront
 - A grandchild needing bail or facing another financial emergency.



A Letter from Larry and Inge Sthreshley, serving in Congo

Dear friends,

"What will endure?" That was the prevailing question throughout a recent farewell trip Larry took with IMA team members and representatives from the British government's Foreign Commonwealth & Development Office (FCDO) to the Kasai Central Province. The ASSR project, which stands for Support to the Health System of the Democratic Republic of Congo, ended on April 25th, 2022. It marks the end of nine years of health system strengthening support for two Congo Provinces by FCDO.

Dr. Eugénie Misenga is a dynamic woman and the director of the provincial health district of the Kasai Central. She commented that it was because of the training she received through FCDO when she was a health zone director that she was able to do her job. She stated, "Without that training, I would never have known the answers to the questions I was asked to get this job. I would not have this job and be serving this population." She regretted that FCDO and IMA World Health were leaving the province and thanked them for their assistance over all these years.

At the beginning of the project nine years ago, at the Kananga health center, they were only seeing 15—20 patients a month, but now the nurse proudly explained that they are seeing 860 patients a month. Larry and his team have worked to lower and standardize prices at all the health centers. In return, the health centers received a subsidy of medicines, equipment, and training from the project. Consequently more people could afford to seek care at the health centers because of lower prices and receive better treatment because the health centers are stocked with necessary medicines & equipment. Nurses had received regular training and supervision. This, in turn, created more demand. The utilization of health centers nine years ago was 34%; now, it is 71%.

When asked what would endure after the project, the response was consistently, "The good health centers that you built and the training we received. What we have learned will endure". Another nurse said explicitly, "Our nutrition program. You have taught us how to prevent and treat childhood malnutrition with local foods. We don't have to wait for an outside program to help us." Within three years since the project began, over 540,000 malnourished children have received five home visits by a trained community health volunteer and have recovered.

The number of children screened for malnutrition each quarter has increased from 21% in 2019 to an average of 92%. Approximately 1,500,000 children between six months and five years of age are being screened quarterly by community volunteers and members of the young mother support groups. Since 2019, the overall prevalence rate for acute malnutrition has dropped from 6.4% to 2.2 % in Nord Ubangi province, from 17.5% to 3.1% in Kasai Central and from a high of 13% to 7.2% in Kasai Province.

Although added later, the nutrition program has become one of the most impactful components of these projects! It is with mixed emotions that we have said goodbye to the people in the local organizations we have worked with; yet I know we have left them and the health center staff with the knowledge and the tools they need to continue in the challenge to lower malnutrition in the communities they serve.
