

Wow! What an energetic and full holiday season we have had, especially here in the life of Harvey Browne. As we moved through Advent and Christmas, I found myself overflowing with gratitude: gratitude for the rituals we share as a community of faith, and gratitude for all the people who work so hard to create meaningful experiences as we celebrate the incarnation of our loving God!

As I've reflected on why this season felt so rich and grounding, even amid the busyness, I keep coming back to the power of ritual. Rituals feel important not just for marking time, but also to help us make meaning of life, highlighting what we value and rooting us in goodness and grace when it's so easy to be pulled in a thousand different directions.

Casper ter Kuile, author of *The Power of Ritual*, likes to use the shorthand that a ritual is "a way of making invisible things visible."

You could say that about our sacraments: baptism and communion. We often say baptism is an outward sign of an inward grace. It's a visible ritual for celebrating God's grace - grace that is given to us; we don't earn it. And the Lord's Supper is a visible sign of our communion with Jesus - a privilege offered to us because God loves us and wants to be in relationship with us.

We consider these rituals sacraments because they're things Jesus did. They are an embodied way to tell the stories of our faith. We engage in these rituals, in part, to do exactly what ter Kuile is saying - make the invisible, visible.

Ter Kuile also reminds us that rituals change us. "They do so by interrupting us," he writes, interrupting our drive toward constant productivity or the monotony of ordinary days. Quoting West African writer Malidoma Patrice Somé, he notes that rituals can even be dangerous because they carry risk: practicing them has the power to transform us.

Each year as we light Advent candles, I'm grateful for the ritual of light bringing. At a time when the world is literally darker, with shorter days and cloudier skies, and metaphorically darker, with all that is going on in the world, a ritual to remind us that there is light, and not just any light, but THE light, Jesus Christ, is deeply grounding.

I hope you have felt some of that transformative power this holiday season as we've engaged together, and individually, in various rituals.

As we are faced with a brand new year, what rituals might you take part in, in the life of church community or beyond, that might interrupt life (in a good way) and have the power to transform? How might invisible things like gratitude, hope, and awe be made visible through ritual in your life?

As we move into a new year, may we allow God's love, made visible through these sacred practices, to interrupt us, ground us, and quietly transform us.

PLEASE:

- LIMIT things that need a can opener. Pop-top cans for soup, veggies, meat or fruit really help.






Booktalk


