Making a Difference

Harvey Browne Memorial Presbyterian Church Newsletter July 2025

One of my favorite lines in all of television came from the show, *Downton Abbey*. Set in the early 20th century on the fictional Downtown Abbey estate in Yorkshire, England, the show follows the lives of the aristocratic Crawley family and their servants. Its plot often focuses on the disparities between the "upstairs" and

"downstairs", demonstrating pointedly how the social hierarchy of the time effectually created separate worlds. When a new Crawley enters the scene – one who has actually worked a paying job – he makes reference to traveling somewhere over the weekend. In horror, the eldest member of the family, the Dowager Countess played by Maggie Smith, widens her eyes while looking around the table before saying that famous line, "what is a weekend?!"



It is a funny, striking line because it demonstrates just how out-of-touch these aristocrats are from the daily requirements of most everyone's everyday life. We work, we care for our families, we sleep. And as the famous song says, "everybody's working for the weekend." For a chance to rest. For a chance to take a breath. When life feels so chock-full of pressure and responsibility, the weekend becomes the goal every time.

An article I recently read in The Guardian magazine talked about the not-so-healthy connection between overwork and a sense of worth. Referencing the religion-based ethic praising hard work and self-denial (while promising punishment for any who are lazy), the Protestant work ethic is thought to have been the driving force behind capitalism. The article discusses how such an ethic still permeates our culture, leading even those who are not religious to feel ashamed for leisure. If a task is accomplished without an adequate amount of anxiety, the assumption is that one didn't try hard enough.

The late Old Testament scholar, Walter Brueggeman, often wrote about how the Puritan legacy of the Protestant work ethic clashed with biblical calls to Sabbath and communal care. Where the former focuses on individual accumulation and self-sufficiency, Brueggeman highlighted how work for the latter was more a tool for supporting one's community, and especially the most vulnerable. While work was important, far more important was Sabbath – an intentional setting down of that which distracts from God and one another.

Perhaps this summer you could find ways to live into a more balanced view of work and worth. Perhaps you could consider the values you place on busyness, worry, anxiety and production, and think about how they are distracting you from focusing on God and the people around you. In asking such questions, may we open ourselves to the gift of balance and Sabbath, so that we're not simply "working for the weekend", but embracing the gift of each day.

Notes from Session

The Session of Harvey Browne Presbyterian Church held a stated meeting on June 3. Marcia Lewis led the Session in prayer after which the following business was conducted:

• Heard reports from Christine & Katherine.

• As part of our summer worship, the program staff is planning a minister-affiliate preaching series in August. The Session approved the program staff selecting those ministers to preach.

• Approved the purchase and mount of a tv and sound bar for Eline Hall. We will use Jeremiah 29 Fund to cover this cost. The Jeremiah 29 Fund was established in 2021 with donations from some church members. The goal of this fund is to provide a reserve that will enable HB to pursue opportunities in congregational vitality, programing and benevolence that exceed the scope of the church's budget.

• Approved replacing the water fountain on the first floor, outside the church's office, with a bottle filler water fountain.

• Cedar Ridge Camp has completed the new Calvin Chapel. The camp needs \$100,000.00 to repay the loans to build the Chapel. The Session agreed to reach out to HB members asking for donations to help Cedar Ridge pay down the loans. Brian Pollock and Anne Hughes, Board members, will develop a strategy to bring this to the attention of the congregation. I invite you to visit Cedar Ridge Camp's website to see pictures of the building of the Chapel or to ride to the camp to see it in person.

• Mike Hunter, chair of Property Committee, reported one of the rooms under the sanctuary had a water pipe leak in the fan coil unit. The repair is extensive and expensive. The other rooms under the sanctuary have the same piping. It was recommended to the committee that the remaining fan coils piping be replaced now, at the same time, before more leaks occur. The Session approved replacing 11 fan coils piping in those rooms, installing isolation valves on each unit, re pipe and re insulate. The cost will be \$45,316; the funds will come from Facilities Reserves. The Preschool Board voted to give \$15,000 towards the cost.

• Heard reports from the committees.

Bellewood-Brooklawn Update

On June17, 2025 Bellewood-Brooklawn received all three renewed licenses from the State of Kentucky, after a very difficult and painful three-year process. The Board has decided to sell the Bellewood Property for an asking price of \$10 M. The hope is to use these funds to rehab current cottages at Brooklawn and increase the services they offer. Pastor Andreas Rio, has been hired part-time to enhance their faith services to resident. Reopening their psychiatric facility as well expanding services to special needs children are priorities. Currently Brooklawn has eight cottages with land to build one or two additional cottages. The Child Protective Services, CPS, which operates within the Department of Community-Based Services (DCBS) has now only 400 Kentucky children needing residential care. Bellewood-Brooklawn's current capacity is 100 children, with a current census of 45 children. Ten cottage "parents" are needed to staff each cottage. Hiring additional cottage parents is very challenging considering the pay and availability of appropriate employees to care for these children 24/7/365. Hence reopening each cottage will take time.
