Making a Difference

Harvey Browne Memorial Presbyterian Church Newsletter June 2025

I recently read a book that totally changed my mind. Or maybe it's more accurate to say the book challenged the way I had been thinking about a particular area of my life. One that I held convictions about but had never really examined.

The book is *How to Keep House While Drowning* by KC Davis. On its surface, it looks like a guide to cleaning and organizing—a self-help book about keeping your life in order. But it turned out to be so much more. Davis doesn't just offer practical help for completing "care tasks" (her name for the daily chores of life—cooking, laundry, dishes, hygiene, etc.). She invites readers to examine the beliefs they carry about these tasks: beliefs about how and when they should be done, what it means when we fall short, and how our worth can become entangled in our productivity.

In our culture, there's often an unspoken belief that there is one "right" way to do things, especially when it comes to the seemingly small but essential acts of everyday care. We can easily turn tasks like doing the dishes or folding laundry into measures of character. A messy home becomes a moral failing; falling behind on chores starts to feel like laziness rather than the result of exhaustion, illness, or simply the fullness



of life. We've absorbed a lot of shame around things that are, at their core, just part of being human.

What I loved about the book was that I unexpectedly encountered grace time and again. Grace that says our worth is not determined by how tidy our homes are or how well we keep up with our to-do lists. Grace that frees us from shame and invites us into compassion. Grace that reminds us it's okay to be human.

That experience reminded me of something deeply theological. As Christians, we are called to ongoing transformation. The Greek word for repentance, *metanoia*, means a change of mind, a turning. And part of our spiritual journey is recognizing when longheld beliefs no longer reflect the truth of God's love and mercy. Sometimes, even the smallest rethinking (a new approach to housework, for example) can open us up to a deeper understanding of who God is and who we are.

Romans 12:2 says, "Do not be conformed to this age, but be transformed by the renewing of the mind, so that you may discern what is the will of God—what is good and acceptable and perfect." I wonder what "renewing your mind" looks like for you these days. Have you encountered a moment of holy rethinking? A book that helped you see things differently? A shift in perspective that led to greater compassion?

Sometimes God surprises us. Sometimes grace comes disguised as a book about chores.

Notes from Session

The Session of Harvey Browne Presbyterian Church held a stated meeting on May 6. Alex Bumpas led the Session in prayer after which the following business was conducted:

• Renata Dewees, Director of Youth Ministries, introduced this year's confirmands to Session and explained the confirmation process. Each confirmand wrote wonderful Statements of Faith and spoke to the Session on their statements. Session voted to receive the following confirmands into membership of Harvey Browne Presbyterian Church: Amelia Esterle, Sophie Esterle, Mary Grogg, Evelyn Yu, Sally Yu, and Annie Welch. Confirmation Sunday was May 11.

• Approved the baptism of Sally Yu, daughter of Ming & Chelesa Yu, on May 11.

• Newly elected Ruling Elders, Ben Durham, Tom Hughes and Jean Wolph shared their journeys of faith with the Session. Session approved receiving Ben, Tom and Jean as new Session members. The service of ordination and installation was May 25.

• Session heard staff reports from Christine and Katherine.

• Elected Tom Hughes as HB's Treasurer and Anne Hughes as Clerk of Session.

• Dr. David Willey, and his father before him, have rented HB's former manse as their dental office for the past 55 years. Dr. Willey is planning retirement and would like to sell his business. In order to sell the business, the new buyer will need to be guaranteed at least a five-year lease on the building. This is a requirement a bank will have for the new owner to receive a loan. Session approved granting a new dentist purchasing the practice of Dr. David Willey a five-year lease.

• Received a report from the Chapel Task Force updating their work.

• With a growth in new group activities, such as Prime Time, Session realizes the need for additional meeting spaces that will be convenient to all members. The Session will study usable space within the church that could accommodate this need.

• Discussion of hosting "summer workdays" to clear clutter throughout the building. A group of Session members will go through the building and make plans to organize the workdays. Members of the congregation will be encouraged to help on the workdays.

• We have a number of never used bed pillows that have been stored in B-3 for a few years. Since HB no longer hosts mission groups, Session approved donating those pillows to Wayside Christian Mission.

• Property and Welcome Committees will mark entrances either by number or lettering. This will ease access to the building for visitors.

• Approved recommendation from Personnel Committee to close the building on Fridays from May 30-August 8. This is a small way to say thank you for working so hard on making this past program year so successful. We hope the staff will take this as a day of rest and rejuvenation.

• Heard reports from the committees.
